The 1940 Census

In 1935, the Works Progress Administration (WPA, later renamed the Works Projects Administration) was established to help "New Deal" agencies put people back to work. One of its early projects was the 1900 census indexing project. That census was chosen for indexing in anticipation of a future federal annuity program (now Social Security). It would provide the place and date of birth for future beneficiaries as birth certificates were not yet universally required in 1900. Having the records indexed would prove to be a great help to federal and state agencies that needed proof of age.

The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) will make digitalized copies of the 1940 Census available to the public for free on their <u>Online Public Access</u> site next April. As with most of the 1930 census, the records will not be indexed by the government. Thanks to **Anita Harris**, we have learned of a tool that may help you find your family in 1940 using Enumeration District (ED) maps: <u>http://www.stevemorse.org/census/</u>.

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Legends from the Graves: Eucheeanna By Wayne Sconiers

The Walton County Heritage Museum will host "Legends from the Graves" at Eucheeanna Presbyterian Cemetery on Saturday, October 1, 2011. Group tours will start at 10:00, 10:30, 11:00, and 11:30 AM. For directions call 850-892-4269. Hot dogs, drinks, and desserts will be sold as well as books including *History of Walton County*. Tickets are \$10 each and may be purchased at The Bookstore on Baldwin Avenue and at the Museum.

The Eucheeanna Presbyterian Cemetery is the final resting place of many of the early settlers of Walton County. The historic marker for the Euchee Valley Presbyterian Church and Cemetery reads:

This is the site of one of Florida's oldest organized Presbyterian Church which was the largest Presbyterian Church in Florida until 1885. On May 27, 1827, the Reverend Murdoch Murphy of the Alabama Synod presided with one Elder, Donald McLean, Sr., and 15 families. This log church served the community for 20 years until a new 50 by 100 ft. church with large inside galleries was built adjacent to the log church in 1847. Reverend Samuel Robinson dedicated the new church on November 26, 1848. Reverend Robert Quarterman Baker, civil war veteran from Georgia, served the church until his death in October 1923. The third and present church was erected, using foundation supports from the original log church. The cemetery contains the remains of many of the original settlers, including two signers of Florida's first Constitution, veterans of all wars dating from the Revolutionary War, civic leaders, elected officials and ministers. There are more than 3,000 graves in the old cemetery, many unmarked, and many brought home from Alabama and Northwest Florida.

The stories of some of those settlers will be told during "Legends from the Grave," including:

- Rev. R. Quarterman Baker Rev. Baker was living in Georgia when he received the call to serve the Euchee Valley Presbyterian Church, the oldest Presbyterian church in the state of Florida. For some unknown reason, his wife and daughter did not follow him here but remained in Georgia.
- **Giles Bowers** Giles Bowers married the daughter of John McKinnon and built the first successful mercantile business in the county.
- **Daniel Douglas Campbell** Campbell was one of the three men credited with meeting Sam Story, chief of the Uchees, and settling the area.
- **Charles Shephard Vinson Jones** Rev. Jones was the Postmaster in Alaqua in 1827 and 1828. He founded the Alaqua Methodist Church in April 1827 and was its first pastor.
- Col. John L. McKinnon McKinnon was one of the three men credited with meeting Sam Story, chief of the Uchees, and settling the area. His son was the author of *History of Walton County*, which was originally published in 1911.
- **Daniel Campbell McLeod** In 1832, McLeod ran successfully for Sheriff against his kinsman, Alexander Campbell. He was a practicing attorney at Eucheeanna before the Civil War. In 1866, he was appointed Judge of the Criminal Court for Walton County by Gov. David S. Walker.
- John Newton Newton was the founder of the Knox Hill Academy and taught there for many years. At one point, he moved to the Camp Walton area and founded a city named for two of his daughters, Mary and Esther.
